Remembering Rheba: A Tribute to Dr. Rheba de Tornyay, Editor Emeritus

The distinguished career of an inspirational nurse leader, educator, trailblazer, colleague, and friend came to a close with the passing of Dr. Rheba de Tornyay in September 2013, at the age of 87. Rheba served as Editor of the Austral of Muschia Editor of the Server of the Company of the C Editor of the Journal of Nursing Educa-tion from 1985 to 1991, a time during which the Journal refocused its mission on publishing high-level research and on publishing high-level research and scholarship. As both an editor and a national nursing leader, she was sometimes a lone voice advocating for support of nursing education scholarship at a time when the profession had identified clinical scholarship as its top priority.
